REOPENING AREAS FOR CARLISLE CANYON AFFECTED BY WOOLSEY FIRE

LOS ANGELES (Fri., Nov. 16, 2018) – The Ventura County Sheriff's Department and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department jointly announce the repopulation of the Carlisle Canyon area that was impacted by the #WoolseyFire. This opening will be effective Friday, November 16, 2018 at 10:00 a.m.

Carlisle Road, west from Mulholland Highway will be reopened beginning at 10:00 a.m. on Friday morning. There will be a hard closure on Mulholland Highway at Country Ranch Road, preventing vehicles from exiting the area at that point.

Simply visit the link and enter an address for the #WoolseyFire area in the search field and press enter. You can then scroll out on the map to determine if the indicated area has a red or green background. Red indicates the area is still closed and unsafe to return. Green indicates the area is open for repopulation. In addition to the map, the above written descriptions of the areas to be opened has been provided.

The Fire Incident Command continues to monitor the active fire areas, as well as those areas remaining closed due to critical infrastructure concerns or safety hazards. Any future information pertaining to safety conditions and repopulation will be updated at the following link: www.LACounty.gov/WoolseyFire/

The Ventura County Sheriff's Department and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department together have a strong presence in the repopulated and evacuated areas for the next several days to ensure the protection of our residents and their property. All other road closures and evacuated areas for the #WoolseyFire remain in effect.

Media Accessibility for People with Disabilities, and others with Access and Functional Needs.

Federal Communication Commission rules under Section 255 of the Communications Act require telecommunications service providers to make their products and services accessible to people with disabilities, if such access is readily achievable. Where access is not readily achievable, service providers must make their devices and services compatible with peripheral devices and specialized customer premises equipment that are commonly used by people with disabilities, if such compatibility is readily available.
